

BA (HONS) TOP-UP DEGREE PROFESSIONAL DANCE AND PERFORMANCE COURSE SUMMARY 2024 ENTRY

COURSE TITLE:	BA (Hons) Top-up Professional Dance and Performance
DURATION OF COURSE:	One year (36 weeks per year not including half-term)
ENTRY REQUIREMENTS:	Entry is via audition. Please refer to Central's 'Audition Criteria' which can be found on the schools' website.
	 For Direct Entry onto the course, the normal requirement will be: The successful completion of a Foundation Degree, or 240 credits on a directly comparable course. the completion of a required entrance task (a piece of reflective writing and a research task). adequate physical, technical & artistic aptitude (see audition criteria). previous training (tested at audition). interest in and aptitude for further academic study (tested at audition interview).
	International Applicants International applicants may be required to achieve a minimum B2 Level, reaching a 5.5 score in each module band, in an approved English language examination such as International English Language Testing System (IELTS for UKVI), in time to commence their visa application in advance of the course.
	Continuing Students Note that completion of the Central School of Ballet Foundation Degree does not guarantee direct entry to the BA (Hons) Top-up Degree course. Students who continue directly from the CSB Foundation Degree are required to formally apply for the BA (Hons) Top-up Degree.
	BA (Hons) Top-up in Professional Dance and Performance applicants are required to demonstrate a strong proficiency in both written and verbal English.
COURSE OUTLINE:	The BA (Hons) Top-up Degree in Professional Dance and Performance is a full-time, one-year course, principally designed to offer a course of study that is continuous with that provided by the school's Foundation Degree course, or equivalent. The course comprises five modules of study with a total of 120 credits, which are all required to obtain the final degree award BA (Hons).
	This course provides a practical understanding of the technical skills and artistry required by the profession in Ballet, Contemporary and Jazz techniques with the opportunity to extend the skill base to virtuosic level, and provides training in aspects of musical theatre performance.
	Throughout the course, and extensively in the Ballet Central module, knowledge is used in creative situations working with teachers and external professional practitioners leading to public performance opportunities in a range of contexts, including a national tour of small and mid-scale theatres.
	The development of individual talent and unique performance qualities is achieved through the breadth of the curriculum, and, most importantly, the National Tour Ballet Central module. In this, the preparation and performance of a wide range of repertoire, requiring the practical application of different techniques and styles, alongside variations in artistic and musical interpretation and characterisation, facilitate the development of individual strengths and versatility, leading to the development of the distinctive and unique performing artist.

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contact hours with School staff and expected self-study: Due to the structure of the course, rehearsals for the performance tour will cover the majority of contact hours during the Spring and Summer terms. The course comprises of five modules to a total of 120 credits. One credit corresponds to approximately ten hours of 'learning time' (including all classes, self-led study and research). Therefore, obtaining 120 credits in an academic year requires 1,200 hours of overall learning time. The overall methods of assessment for the Modules (for example exams, course work or practical assignments): The course is a practical, vocational training course for dancers. This means that assessment is mostly of practical work both on a continuous basis and in formal assessment revents. In addition, independent project and Contextual Studies work will be assessed both on a continuous and formal basis. Feedback from all assessments is given with on-going self-assessment allows the student, in consultation with their tutor, to set regular learning targets. Any extra costs (in addition to fees) which students may have to pay to complete the course and estimated cost:	 Direct Entry Students For Direct Entry students only, a one-off acceptance fee of £100 will be due when you accept your place on the course. Home fee paying students (who are not eligible for the Assisted Application Scheme) will be required to a pay a £650.00 deposit, to secure their place. This deposit will then be deducted from further additional costs, such as the private medical insurance. Direct Entry students are required to complete the Central School of Ballet 'Health Certificate', which needs to be completed by the student's local GP. Please note, note all GPs are able to complete such a document, so it may be necessary for students to have this completed by a private Doctor. Prices may vary.
	 All Students It is compulsory for students to have private medical insurance. Students are encouraged to register with our school private medical scheme (currently provided by AXA PPP Healthcare) which is charged at cost by Central. Estimated annual cost in the region of £1490.00. Compulsory school uniform: For female students: approximately £600 annually. For male students: approximately £400 annually. In addition to this, students may go through several pairs of ballet and pointe shoes per year. Female students will also be required to purchase a classical practice tutu Estimated cost of £150.00. Resources fee which covers the cost of costume and castanet loan, locker hire and library resources over the duration of the course: £130.00. Please note, should a student lose their locker key or need a replacement, there will be an additional charge of £20.00. Students will require access to a personal device i.e a laptop or computer and access to sufficient Wi-Fi to allow them to carry out the written or online elements of the course. Students are required to purchase a notebook / journal. Audition photographs are approximately £140.00 and Ballet Central hoodies are approximately £30.00. Students on the BA (Hons) Top-up are also required to purchase a pair of steel toe capped shoes for the purpose of the Ballet Central Tour. Price varies; roughly £30.00.
	 International Students For Direct Entry students, a deposit of £3,000.00 will be required to secure your place on the course. International students who will require a Student Visa will be required to cover the cost of the visa which is £363 (at date if publication) if applying from outside of the UK or £490 if applying from in the UK In addition to the cost of the visa itself, the student will be expected to cover any other costs that form part of the visa process, including but not limited to, the IELTS Academic for UKVI Exam (English Language Exam) and the health surcharge.
